Equality and Welsh Language Impact Assessment

Summary

1. Name of Proposal/policy:

Flintshire County Council wishes to seek the views of interested parties regarding the proposal to close Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain from 31st of August 2016 with existing pupils transferring to other schools in the local area, subject to parental preference.

The consultation document sets out information which consultees should consider to participate fully in the consultation process. The process follows regulatory guidance as set out in the Welsh Government's School Organisation Code 2013.

The formal consultation period commenced on Wednesday 21st October 2015 and ended on Wednesday 2nd December 2015.

Following the formal consultation period and the publication of a consultation report, Cabinet took the decision to proceed to publish the proposal by way of a statutory notice for 28 days from Friday 29th January 2016 to Friday 26th February 2016.

The proposal is to close Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain (English Medium, Community School) as of the 31st August 2016, with the pupils transferring to the local network of schools based on parental preference.

4. Main Aims/purposes/outcomes of the policy:

The proposal is put forward on the basis of criteria laid down in the Council's School Modernisation Strategy, namely:-

- Unfilled places across the primary school portfolio Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain as at January 2015 (PLASC) had 66 full time pupils with unfilled places at 13.16%. As of September 2015 the school population has 55 full time pupils with unfilled places at 27.63%;
- Diminishing resource criteria (schools supported by pupils not from their local community and/or small numbers within the community raise concern regarding sustainability within the school's portfolio) - 83.63% of pupils attending Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain are not attending their local school;
- Small School Criteria The School population and capacity of Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain is lower than national designation of a small school, additionally school numbers do not meet the minimum requirements of primary school models as noted in the Council's School Modernisation Strategy, and

Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain is also currently (July 2015) in Welsh
Government categorisation 4, on a scale of 1-4, with 4 being the lowest for
education standards. This is expected to change at the next annual review.

5. Have employees/ service users/public been engaged/consulted on proposed changes: YES/ NO

Yes

A consultation event was offered for children and young people of Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain. The Governors of Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain requested that the Council did not meet with the School Council of Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain. The Governors felt that the pupils had already submitted their views on the proposed closure of the school in letter format. The Governing Body confirmed via correspondence dated 11th November 2015 and 30th November 2015 that they were satisfied that the pupils have been able to submit their views with regard proposed school closure. They were firmly of the view that it was not in the children's best interests to experience the anxiety and upset by completing the children's and young person's version of the consultation document.

Consultation events were also arranged with the school council at Cornist C.P. School and Ysgol Owen Jones, Northop. The events were facilitated by the Healthy Schools Lead Practitioner whose role included engaging and consulting with pupils. A member of the School Modernisation Team was also present at the School Council meetings. Gwynedd C.P. School, Flint chose to facilitate their own meeting with the school council to discuss the proposal. Children and young people also had the opportunity to respond to the consultation using the children and young people's version of the consultation document.

A consultation event was also arranged for parents/carers of Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain. This was facilitated by Officers from Flintshire County Council. Parents/Carers had the opportunity to discuss the proposal with Officers. Other interested parties were able to respond via the consultation response form, available in paper format and online.

Consultation and sharing of the Equality and Welsh Language Impact Assessment with the Flintshire County Council Corporate Equality Impact Assessment Quality Assurance Group was also completed during and after the consultation period. This group consists of Officers of the Council and public members of the community from protected characteristics and considered the identified impacts and provide feedback on any possible ways to limit the negative impact or promote a positive impact on Welsh Language and/or protected groups. This assessment will be an organic process throughout the consultation period.

As a result of meeting with the Council Corporate Equality Impact Assessment Quality Assurance Group an amended version 2 of the Equality Impact Assessment for this proposal has been produced.

6. What is being done to limit any negative impact or promote positive impact on Welsh language and/or protected groups (See section 2):

Ysgol Maes Edwin, is located in the village of Flint Mountain, it is an English Medium primary school for pupils aged 3-11 years of age. It is currently Category 4 for standards in the Welsh Government categorisation model.

The alternative nearby schools identified as alternative schools which may potentially take pupils from Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain should it close are as follows:-

Ysgol Gwynedd, Flint is located in the town of Flint, approximately 2.24 miles from Ysgol Maes Edwin. Ysgol Gwynedd is an English Medium primary school for pupils aged 3-11 years of age and is currently Category 2 for standards in the Welsh Government categorisation model.

Cornist C.P. School, Flint is located in the town of Flint, approximately 2.73 miles from Ysgol Maes Edwin. Cornist C.P. School is an English primary school for pupils aged 3-11 years of age and is currently Category 1 for standards in the Welsh Government categorisation model.

Ysgol Owen Jones, Northop is located in the village of Northop, approximately 1.43 miles from Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain. Ysgol Owen Jones is an English Medium primary school for pupils aged 3-11 years of age and is currently Category 1 for standards in the Welsh Government categorisation model.

Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain and the local primary schools above whom are likely to accept Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain pupils should it close are classified as community based, English medium schools therefore there are no obvious negative impacts on Welsh Language.

Subject to parental preference there is the option for pupils from Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain to access welsh medium education at other Flintshire schools should the proposal to close the school go ahead. Ysgol Croes Atti, Flint is the nearest welsh medium school to Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain.

7. How will the proposals help promote equality, eliminate discrimination and promote good relations?

Local primary schools within the local area (Ysgol Gwynedd, Flint, Cornist C.P. School, Flint and Ysgol Owen Jones, Northop) to which the pupils will potentially select should Ysgol Maes Edwin, Flint Mountain close have their own equality and diversity statements. Each school will have their own ethos around promoting equality, eliminating discrimination and promoting good relations.

Consultation and sharing of the Equality Impact Assessment with the Flintshire County Council Corporate Equality Impact Assessment Quality Assurance Group has been completed during the consultation period. This group consists of Officers of the Council and public members of the community from protected characteristics.

Pupil data from the Inclusion Services has also been analysed. The data sets do not include the nursery pupils.

Workforce information from the HR Business Partner team has also been analysed.

There is no available equality data for Governors at the school. Information is collected from Governors when they commence as new Governors and annually. The collection of data is anonymous and is not compulsory – data that is available is not attributable to a specific school.
