Settlement Commentary

Brynford is a small rural village in the North West of the County. The settlement is located to the South of Holywell and the A55 within the general area of Halkyn and Holywell common which contains several tumuli and cairns. Historically the area surrounding Brynford was extensively mined for lead. The built form is primarily centred around the crossing of the B5121 (roughly aligns North to South) and the Brynford Road (roughly aligns East to West). The bulk of the settlement lies to the South of the crossroads at Hafod y Bryn adjacent to the existing school. Despite its proximity to Holywell, the character of the settlement is very much that of a rural village.



BUCKLEY - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Buckley was a location for coal mining and also developed as a centre for pottery and brick manufacturing and this led to people moving into the area to find work. Although the mining and brickworks have now ceased, Buckley still has a number of industrial estates, as well nearby Castle Cement, and benefits from its proximity to and good communications with other major centres of population and employment within Flintshire, Wrexham and Chester. Buckley has continued to be a popular residential area, and brownfield (and greenfield) sites have been redeveloped for housing. Buckley is one of the largest towns in Flintshire and is located between Mold and Broughton. It has good links with Mold, Wrexham and Chester and is in close proximity to the junction of the A55T and A494T. Buckley also benefits from a railway station on the Wrexham – Bidston line at Little Mountain and has a good level of both local and regional bus services, linking with Chester, Ellesmere Port, Wrexham and Mold.

The town physically adjoins Mynydd Isa to the west, Alltami to the north and Drury to the north east and enables each of these settlements to benefit from shared services and facilities. The town has a pedestrianised town centre and an indoor shopping precinct and has a supermarket, with a second supermarket under construction. In addition to the range of shops and services in the town centre, there are also a range of other services and facilities strung out along Mold Road, Brunswick Road and Chester Road. It has several primary schools and a secondary and a new health centre. The town's industrial and mining legacy has resulted in significant areas of land being reclaimed as a country park and also features extensive areas of common land, but has also resulted in landfill. Many of these areas are either SSSI or SAC on account of its importance for Great Crested Newts.

According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Buckley post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 4 – >30 mega bytes per second with the average speeds in Buckley being 10mbps. Clearly broadband provision in Buckley is mixed with the majority of the settlement having less than average broadband provision. Broadband provision is important even for a town like this because of the impacts of slow speeds upon the ability of businesses to operate within the area and to provide investment and local employment.


The new health clinic on Mill Lane has replaced the former health clinic.

Buckley benefits from a town centre and local shopping facilities on Mold Road and Lane End. Buckley town serves a wider rural area. Information for the town centre goes back to the 1980's (a number of town centre land use surveys have taken place in recent years). Services and facilities within the town have changed particularly within the town centre and there are now ongoing regeneration efforts which are delivering new services within the town. For example the new Mill Lane Medical Centre was recently completed and the Potters Wheel public house has also demolished with work beginning on the new Aldi foodstore (expected to open December 2015).

Mapping Service Provision

Buckley benefits from an extensive range of services and facilities most of which are within the Town Centre, some of the service provision has been mapped for illustrative purposes and is presented overleaf. As the illustrative map of service provision suggests service provision in Buckley is excellent.







Public transportation services serving the village are limited and the position of the village in the AONB makes it quite isolated. Mold (4.6 miles) is within reasonable driving distance of the village and offers a much wider range of services and facilities.





CONNAHS QUAY - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Connah's Quay constitutes just under half of the population of the "Deeside" area and is the largest town in Flintshire. The town benefits from being directly adjacent Shotton Town Centre and further benefits from a commercial corridor of development which runs from Queensferry to Kelsterton (Coleg Cambria). This commercial corridor as illustrated on the service provision map contains the vast majority of services and facilities in Connahs Quay and not only services resident's needs but also provides an important employment and investment location. However it is clear that service provision within Connahs Quay is disproportionately weighted to the bottom road and there are large residential areas of the town which appear to be situated a considerable distance from the majority of service provision.

Broadband Provision

According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Connahs Quay post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 2.7 - >30 mega bytes per second with the best speeds restricted to the bottom road and with most postcodes in Connahs Quay at around 5 mbps. Accordingly it is to be expected that broadband provision in Connahs Quay is very poor. Broadband provision is important even for an urban area like this because of the impacts of slow speeds upon the ability of businesses to operate within the area and to provide investment and local employment.

Other Comments

With regard to its range of facilities, there is also a Police Station and a Cattery on Wepre Drive and a Vets opposite Wepre PO. Connah's Quay is the largest town in Flintshire, lying within the Deeside conurbation along the River Dee, near the border with England. It is located 6 miles west of Chester and can be reached by road from the A548, by rail from the nearby Shotton railway station, and also is on the National Cycle Network Route 5. It is also lies just south of Deeside Industrial Park, one of the


largest such complexes in the region. The major part of Tata steelworks is also on the town's border on the north bank of the River Dee. Wepre Woods, an ancient woodland in the town, is controlled by Flintshire County Council's Ranger Service and includes Ewloe Castle which dates from the 13th century.

Previous Surveys of Service Provision

Connahs Quay benefits from a district centre and local shopping facilities at Thornfield Avenue, Englefield Avenue and the recently regenerated centre at Ffordd Llanarth. These centres are monitored and it is to be expected that there have been changes in service provision over the last 15 years. Specifically and most notably in Connahs Quay Precinct has seen the relocation of the market, the development of the Medical Centre to the rear of the Precinct, the closure of the Co-operative food supermarket, the provision of a new Flintshire Connects one stop shop attached to the Connahs Quay Library, and the phased closure of the Council Offices. Whilst at Ffordd Llanarth the original 1980's local centre has now been cleared and replaced with a new modern facility which offers a large supermarket (Morrisons) as well as a range of small units to house the original occupants of the demolished local centre. Outside of the shopping centres schools at Custom House Lane have been demolished to provide a new merged primary education facility.

Mapping Service Provision

Connahs Quay benefits from an extensive range of services and facilities some of the service provision has been mapped for illustrative purposes and is presented overleaf. The length of the bottom road through Connahs Quay has small clusters of commercial facilities which provide local facilities and services as well as providing local employment opportunities. Unfortunately it has not been possible to indicate all services along this important route. As the illustrative map of service provision suggests service provision in Connahs Quay is excellent albeit it is weighted disproportionately to the North of Connahs Quay along the bottom road.



CYMAU - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Cymau is a small village in the south east corner of the County, nestled into the south side of Hope Mountain in a largely undeveloped rural and relatively isolated part of the County. It is a linear village following Cymau Lane, with the exception of two cul de sac developments of Maesteg and The Nurseries. With the exception of two places of worship and community centre, the village has no other facilities. Residents would need to travel to Caergwrle or into Wrexham County Borough area to access facilities and services. Although the village has several bus services, the timing and frequency of these mean that most journeys to work and leisure purposes, are likely to be car based.







Settlement Commentary

Ewloe is a large urban village located on and dissected by the A494(T) with Ewloe Green lying to the west of the A55T. To the east of Ewloe is Hawarden and to the south of the settlement, beyond the A55(T) is Drury and Buckley. To the north of Ewloe is Shotton and Queensferry. Ewloe forms part of the larger Deeside area and is in close proximity to Deeside Industrial Park. The settlement is also highly accessible given its proximity to the A55T and A494T, proximity to railway stations and good bus services. The settlement has grown significantly over the past few decades with the development of St David's Park which comprises a hotel, business park and residential development. The settlement has a number of high profile employers within the Business Park and a good range of services and facilities and also has the benefit of being able access facilities and services in nearby settlements.


Previous Surveys of Service Provision

In 2000 Ewloe was assessed as part of the Unitary Development Plan's preparation. The survey identified that Ewloe had significant facility provision albeit primarily in the locality of Ewloe Green. Over the last 15 years there has been significant change in Ewloe with the development of new homes in the area of St. Davids Park and the provision of new services and facilities therein e.g. Church at St. Davids Park, Spar on St. Davids Road, and Running Hare public house. Over the same period there has been a loss of facilities such as the closure of the Boars Head on Mold Road.

Comparing the 2000 situation with 2015 it appears that services and facilities within Ewloe have improved significantly.

FFRITH - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

The village is situated in the southernmost part of the county in the wooded valley of the River Cegidog with Llanfynydd one mile to the north. In the 19th century, the village's size and importance grew as quarrying and mining became more significant and the Wrexham and Minera Joint Railway was built through the village along with a small station, a number of shops and several pubs. Industry in the area declined through the 20th century, with the railway ceasing operation in 1952 and the village shops and pubs have now closed. With the exception of a church and village hall, the village has few services and facilities following the recent closure of the two pubs. Residents would be likely to use nearby villages and Wrexham County to access everyday facilities and services. Despite having several bus services, the frequency and timings mean that it is likely residents accessing work and leisure activities would do so by using a private car.



FFYNNONGROYW - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Ffynnongroyw is located within the coastal strip, on the south side of the A548 Coast Road, in the north western part of the County, roughly equidistant between Holywell and Prestatyn. Nearby is the site of the old Point of Ayr colliery which opened in the late 19th Century. As a result the village population grew considerably with people migrating there to work the mine. The linear settlement lies between the dual carriageway to the north and a wooded hillside to the south. Much of the village is characterised by numerous terraced houses the majority of which were built between 1890 and 1920. There is a conservation area which has helped the settlement to retain much of its character and appearance. Despite its relatively small size, Ffynnongroyw has a particular urban character and benefits from a range of services both in the village and in the nearby village of Pen-y-Ffordd.



Settlement Commentary

Flint is a key town within Flintshire benefiting from a large town centre which serves Flint and surrounding rural villages including Bagillt, Flint Mountain, and Northop. The town benefits from Flint Railway Station which affords access to Chester, Manchester, Liverpool and London amongst other places. Flint is well served by bus services both along the coast road to Prestatyn, Holywell, Deeside and Chester and inland to Mold and Wrexham. Within Flint there are significant employment opportunities at Castle Industrial Estate, Aber Park and within the town centre. The town benefits from 3 high schools (Flint High, Maes Hyfryd & St. Richard Gwyn) as well as 4 primary schools and local daycare (public and private facilities). Flint Pavillion provides opportunity for swimming, sports and fitness and has indoor and outdoor facilities at Flint High. As a settlement Flint has an excellent standard of service provision given the relatively small size of its population.

Broadband Provision

According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Flint post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 4.1 – 23.8 mega bytes per second with most postcodes at around 8-15 mbps. Clearly broadband provision in Flint is mixed with the majority of the settlement having less than good broadband provision. Broadband provision is important even for a town like this because of the impacts of slow speeds upon the ability of businesses to operate within the area and to provide investment and local employment.


Flint Town is currently experiencing significant redevelopment, regeneration and investment mainly centred around three key projects – the demolition of the Lea and Castle maisonettes; the construction of a new medical centre which will part replace the existing clinic on Prince of Wales Avenue and the former cottage hospital (now closed); and the rationalisation of public facilities with the creation of the Flintshire Connects and the relocation of the police station into County Offices.

Previous Surveys of Service Provision

Flint has a town centre and supporting local centres with many services and facilities. There have been many surveys of Flint, and services and facilities have changed considerably within the town since 2000. Generally speaking the town centre has expanded considerably over the last 15 years to the benefit of the town eg Aldi, Asda, Mcdonalds, and arrival of Sainsburys in the former Focus DIY unit in 2008. In 2013 the Cottage Hospital closed which resulted in the loss of local bedspace and medical facilities. In 2013 the Ambulance Station closed, this has since been converted for a vehicle hire company. In 2014 Natwest Bank closed as part of National Service changes.

Mapping Service Provision

It is considered that Flint benefits from an excellent range of services and facilities, some of these services are illustrated diagrammatically on the map overleaf.



FLINT MOUNTAIN - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Flint Mountain is a small village located outside of Flint and on the road to Northop. The built form of the village has a clear rural edge and is easily definable within an attractive rural setting. The village benefits from its position between Flint, the A55 and Northop in terms of convenience of public transport, access to services and facilities elsewhere and access to employment.





Glan Y Don is situated on the A548 coast road of the County to the North of Maes Pennant Mostyn. Glan Y Don is almost 1 mile long and consists of a fragmented ribbon form of loose residential and commercial development alongside the A548. As a consequence it is very difficult to define the boundaries of Glan Y Don despite what appears to be a small hub of service provision within close proximity to the football pitch. Near to Glan Y Don are Maes Pennant (Mostyn) and Rhewl Mostyn within which are additional services including primary school and local shops and conveniences. Mostyn Port is a key employer within the area and this is situated nearby. Bus Services along the coast road provide access to key towns including Holywell and Prestatyn.





Settlement Commentary

Greenfield is located close to Holywell and has developed historically from the industrialisation of the Greenfield Valley. The B5121 runs the length of Greenfield Valley connecting Greenfield and Holywell. This area is semi-urban in character with a loose and sometimes fragmented built pattern of development running along its length. Greenfield benefits from services and facilities primarily along the B5121 but also in nearby Holywell Town Centre which includes supermarkets, banks, a range of shops, library, leisure centre and several other facilities. The Greenfield Valley is also home to a 2km linear heritage park which attracts thousands of visitors each year between the months of March and October and is a valuable local community asset for the residents of Holywell and Greenfield. Greenfield benefits from lying near key coastal employment areas such as Greenfield Business Park and Holywell Town Centre. Regular bus services also mean that other coastal employment areas and towns are conveniently accessed from Greenfield (eg Flint).



Settlement Commentary

Gronant is located at the north western edge of the County adjacent to the boundary with Denbighshire. The main part of the village lies on the south side of the A548 on the lower slopes of the Clwydian Range AONB. A smaller part of the village lies on the northern side of the A548 on flat land comprising the coastal strip. The upper part of the village is well screened by a wooded hillside rising up from the coastal strip and a broad linear ridge. The village is well catered for in terms of facilities and services and benefits from relative close proximity to Prestatyn and services within the town centre including railway station with access to the rest of North Wales. The Gronant Dunes form part of an extensive network of dunes which extends from Prestatyn in Denbighshire to the Point of Ayr at the entrance to the Dee Estuary. These dunes are of national and international importance.



Settlement Commentary

Gwaenysgor is an attractive small rural settlement situated in the north western tip of the County. It lies wholly within the Clwydian Range Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) as does the surrounding countryside, and the heart of the settlement is designated as an extensive Conservation Area. Service provision within the village is very limited with the nearest post office branches for example, being located Meliden and Trelawnyd. The relative close proximity of Prestatyn, the potential for employment opportunities therein and the wide range of available services within the town centre are likely to meet the needs of this settlement's population although in winter months access to the and from the village can be difficult due to snow and ice.

Accordingly it is to be expected that broadband provision in Gwaenysgor is poor and is constrained. This is likely to have a negative effect on the ability of local residents seeking to operate business in the local area and on access online services such as banking, post office services or online shopping.

Other Comments

Both villages also suffer from an inadequate sewerage system which overflows onto Cwm Road Trelawnyd during times of extreme weather. In practice, anyone living in either village has to have access to a vehicle as the bus services are impractical.



Settlement Commentary

Hawarden is a historic settlement lying on the edge of the Deeside conurbation. It occupies a slightly elevated position with land sloping downwards in a northerly direction towards the R. Dee and in an easterly direction to Hawarden Airport. To the south east of the settlement is Hawarden Castle and associated parkland. The village centre has a conservation area and numerous listed buildings. The settlement physically adjoins Mancot to the north and is separated from Ewloe to the west by the Gladstone Playing Fields and the Hawarden High School Playing Fields. Although the village lacks a convenience food shop, it does have a wide range of facilities and services, many of which are higher end shops attracting customers from further afield. Indeed, Hawaden was named in the top 10 places to live in Wales in 2014 by the Sunday Times. The village also has a good accessibility as a result of the railway station and bus services. It benefits from being in close proximity to the facilities and services in nearby settlements and also local employment centres.

According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Hawarden post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 5 - 20.3 mega bytes per second with most postcodes in Hawarden village at 19mbps whilst properties in the Big Mancot area at around 9 mbps. Broadband provision within Hawarden is considered to be below average to very good. This will have a beneficial effect on the ability of businesses and local residents seeking to operate a business or in accessing online services such as banking, post office services or online shopping.



Hendre has a public house but otherwise has no other services to speak of. Residents in the Hendre area are reasonably well served by the Mold – Denbigh Road which offers access to larger settlements including Mold and Denbigh.





HOLYWELL - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Holywell's built form consists of its attractive and historic town centre together with three distinct residential areas these being the Holyway, Pen y Maes and the Strand. Closely linked both historically and physically is the settlement of Greenfield which is located to the north east of the town on the B5121 road. The pedestrianised market town not only serves the shopping and other commercial needs of the its own residents but also those of the surrounding villages such as Brynford, Carmel, Gorsedd, Halkyn, Licswm, Lloc, Pentre Halkyn, Rhes-y-Cae, Whitford and Ysceifiog all of which are within a 10km radius of Holywell. According to the Town Council's website there are approximately 120 businesses in Holywell town centre of which about 50% are retail outlets with the remainder being commercial and or service businesses. Collectively, these businesses employ in the region of 800 full and part-time staff. Town centre businesses are a mix of several small businesses and some national stores such as Lidl, Peacocks and Tesco.

In addition there are also a wide variety of other businesses outside the town centre but within the town/settlement boundary. A group called the "Holywell Town Partnership" is made up of representatives from the town and county councils as well as local businesses and local organisations. The aim of the partnership, which has an ongoing programme of initiatives, is to work together to benefit the economy of the town. Holywell has a very good range of professional, financial/ commercial services and facilities. It is highly accessible to the primary and core highway network by private and public transport to other towns in Flintshire and beyond the County Boundary e.g Denbigh, Rhyl and Chester. Employment opportunities are available along the A 548 coast road at Greenfield Business Park and Bagillt e.g. the Manor Industrial Estate.

Broadband Provision

According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Holywell post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 6.5 – 19 mega bytes per second with the slowest speeds in Holway with the remainder of Holywell benefiting from an average of 14 mbps. Accordingly it is to be expected that broadband provision in Holywell is mixed with the majority of the settlement having reasonable broadband provision. Broadband provision is important even for a semi-urban town like this because of the impacts of slow speeds upon the ability of businesses to operate within the area and to provide investment and local employment.


Anew school is presently being constructed in Holywell, with an estimated completion ready for September 2016, and this will replace the existing Ysgol y Fron, Perth y Terfyn and Holwell High School.

Previous Surveys of Service Provision

Holywell is a rural market town and serves a wider rural area and benefits from a town centre and local shopping facilities in the Holway, and at Pen y Maes. Information for the town centre goes back to the 1980's (see the town centre land use survey). Services and facilities within the town have changed particularly within the town centre which has been the subject of several regeneration schemes over the last two decades. In the last decade the town has seen the arrival of new large foodstores and the closure of the Kwik Save and the Co-Operative, the former now occupied by Home Bargains. It also has lost its court, registrar office and walk in police station. In addition the Ambulance Station has recently undergone refurbishment works.

Mapping Service Provision

Holywell benefits from an extensive range of services and facilities most of which are within the Town Centre, some of the service provision has been mapped for illustrative purposes and is presented overleaf. As the illustrative map of service provision suggests service provision in Holywell is excellent.



LEESWOOD - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Leeswood is a reasonable sized village located to the south east of Mold, off the A5104. The built form of the village is relatively easily identified but the coalescence of Leeswood with the adjoining villages of Pontybodkin and Coed Talon does make the settlement boundary somewhat arbitrary. Service provision within Leeswood will serve surrounding communities including Pontybodkin, Coed Talon and Pontblyddyn particularly the primary school. Bus services within the village provide regular services to Mold and to Wrexham.



With the exception of the railway station and local employment opportunities it has none of the facilities and services that would be expected of a settlement. Residents would be likely to need to access everyday facilities and services in Buckley, Drury and Penyffordd / Penymynydd. Little Mountain is very closely related to Buckley and the railway station provides a key facility which serves the Buckley area.







LLANFYNYDD - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Llanfynydd is located in the Cegideg Valley on the B5101 between Ffrith and Treuddyn. The village developed primarily in the 19th century as a result of quarrying and mining in the area and the Wrexham and Minera Joint Railway. With the introduction of passenger services, a station was provided at Llanfynydd in 1898 but this closed in 1950, and the line closed completely in 1952. The village benefits from a primary school, church, pub and post office as well as a small number of commercial ventures. Nevertheless, residents would be likely to use nearby villages and Wrexham CBC to access everyday facilities and services. Despite having several bus services, the frequency and timings mean that it is likely residents accessing work and leisure activities would do so by using a private car.



MAES PENNANT MOSTYN - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Mostyn (Maes Pennant) is a settlement in the north west of the County located close to the Dee Estuary. However historically there are linkages with other nearby "settlements" such as Llannerch y Mor and Glan y Don (alongside the coast road) and inland - Rhewl and Tre Mostyn. The Port of Mostyn has a key role in Flintshire's economy. A roll on/roll of ferry to Dublin operated up until 2004 as part of the Liverpool – Dublin route. Manufactured wings for the Airbus A380 are taken from Mostyn after travelling by barge down the River Dee from the Airbus factory at Broughton. More recently the Port has been the construction base for some of the Irish Sea offshore wind farms e.g.North Hoyle, Rhyl Flats and the Gwynt Y Mor farm which is currently under construction. The settlement benefits from a good range of facilities including shops, doctor's surgery, church and Bryn Pennant County Primary School.

Settlement Commentary

Mancot is a relatively modern settlement located on land which gently slopes down from Hawarden towards the R. Dee. It is bounded to the south by Hawarden and Ewloe and to the north by Sandycroft and Pentre. The settlement is made up of a number of blocks of residential development each with their own names i.e. Royal Mancot, Big Mancot and Little Mancot yet there is little to distinguish these areas on the ground. Mancot has a modest level of local facilities and services and also benefits from being able to access services and facilities in nearby settlements including Hawarden and Ewloe. It is well located in relation to nearby centres of employment and has a good level of bus services.



MOLD - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Mold is a key town within the County whose services and facilities serve Mold and surrounding settlements including Nercwys, Gwernymynydd, Gwernaffield, Pantymwyn, Cilcain, Rhydymwyn, Sychdyn, Mynydd Isa, New Brighton, Leeswood and Treuddyn. Mold benefits from a well-developed and attractive town centre together with a number of key facilities including the only Welsh Medium High School in the County. The built form of the town is relatively easily defined with a clear rural edge which provides an attractive setting to the town at the base of the Alyn Valley below the Clwydian AONB.

Mold developed around Mold Castle. The motte and bailey was built by the Norman Robert de Montalt in around 1140. By the 17th century the town developed as a result of the nearby coal mining industry. By the 18th century the town developed as a result of lead mining in the area. By the 19th century the town grew further by the growth of coal mining in and around the town and it also had its own cotton mill and later a tin plate works.

In the 18th Century Mold became the administrative centre for the County of Flintshire, by the 1760s Quarter Sessions were held in the town, by 1833 there was a County Hall and by 1871 the county gaol was established. The town continues to be the home of Flintshire County Councils County Hall and is the administrative centre of the county.

The nearest station is at Buckley which has connections to Wrexham and Liverpool. Flint railway station, to which Mold is connected by regular bus services, is not much further, and has direct services to Cardiff, London and Manchester. Throughout the day, there are many bus services each hour from Mold Bus Station to Chester and Wrexham as well as other nearby towns (including Denbigh, Holywell and Ruthin) and villages.

Attractions in Mold include St Mary's Church (a 15th-century parish church), a small museum and the renowned Clwyd Theatr Cymru which houses two theatres, the Emlyn Williams theatre and the Anthony Hopkins Theatre. It also houses the town's only cinema.

The town centre has a good mix of shops, pubs and restaurants. Mold has a diverse street market every Wednesday and Saturday at which much fresh produce and many other goods can be obtained as well as a cattle market. For speciality and fresh local food, the Celyn Farmers Market is held on the first and third Saturdays of every month in Mold. There is also The Mold Food & Drink Festival which is held during September each year. In addition to the street market, Mold has a livestock market on Mondays and Fridays. The town boasts 6 supermarkets, 7 Community Centres or halls, 4 doctors' surgeries, a library, a community hospital, 5 dental practises and 9 places of worship. The town has a sports centre with a swimming pool and a range of sports facilities including rugby cricket and football clubs.

Mold has two secondary schools serve the town and the surrounding villages. With approximately 1,800 pupils, the Alun School is the largest school in the county. It is adjoined by the only Welsh Language secondary school in Flintshire, Ysgol Maes

Garmon. It is also home to 4 primary schools the largest being, Ysgol Bryn Coch, with approximately 650 pupils.

In terms of employment opportunities Mold has the Community hospital, County Hall, Theatre Clwyd and the County Law Courts. There are also many retail uses and Mold Business Park houses the Tate and Lyle and Mondi Packaging factories whilst Bromfield Industrial estate has other smaller units with a variety of retail, service and industrial uses.

Broadband Provision

According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Mold post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 4.8 – 23.7 megabytes per second with most postcodes at around 12 mbps. Clearly broadband provision in Mold is mixed with the majority of the settlement having less than good broadband provision. Broadband provision is important even for a town like this because of the impacts of slow speeds upon the ability of businesses to operate within the area and to provide investment and local employment.



Mynydd Isa benefits from regular bus services and convenient access to employment opportunities, services and facilities within these two nearby towns. is well served educationally with two primary schools and a secondary school. Other amenities include a pub, various shops and the local village centre which houses the library, a doctor's surgery and a pharmacy.



There is also a Library, Community Centre, Primary Schools, High School, and a variety of open spaces and equipped play areas". In addition to the 2000 survey it is known that there were two public houses in the village in 2000 (The Mercia and The Griffin). Comparing 2000 service provision to 2015 the main change appears to be the loss of the public house (The Mercia) which has now been converted into a Sainsburys local convenience store.

Mynydd Isa has a good level of service provision and benefits from being close to Buckley and Ewloe. As the illustrative map of service provision suggests service provision in Mynydd Isa is very good and the close proximity of Buckley and Ewloe further improve service provision to the benefit of local residents.



NANNERCH - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Nannerch is a small and attractive settlement located immediately to the south of the A541 Mold – Denbigh Road. The village is relatively compact with a historic central core which is designated as a Conservation Area. The village is situated some distance away from any major settlements (Holywell 5 miles, Mold 7 miles) being located in a relatively isolated part of the County in an area of undeveloped countryside and high landscape value within the Clwydian Range Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.







NORTHOP - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Northop is a medium to large sized village strategically located on the A55 between Mold and Flint. The village has good definable edges and the built form is attractive and benefits from a Conservation Area. The village has a reasonable – good range of service provision and benefits from the relative close proximity of the College located outside of the village on the old A55. Settlement Commentary

Penyffordd / Penymynydd is a growing settlement which is located at the confluence of the A550 and the A5104 and has its own railway station on the Wrexham — Bidston line,one km from the village centre . The settlement has excellent communications to nearby towns and employment centres as well as further afield, given the presence of the railway station. The settlement has been by-passed (in 1986) along its western edge by the new line of the A550 and estate type residential development has taken place on either side of Wrexham Road and Hawarden Road. The settlement has two schools St Hohn the Baptist School and Ysgol Penyffordd (which is split between infants at Abbots lane and juniors at Ffordd Penyffordd), and a range of local shops and facilities and is considered to represent a sustainable settlement. There is significant development taking place at the village at the present time which will benefit existing services and facilities. As part of new developments for example new sport and recreation facilities are being provided.





Accordingly it is to be expected that broadband provision in Queensferry is reasonable but still constrained. Broadband provision is important even for an urban area like this because of the impacts of slow speeds upon the ability of businesses to operate within the area and to provide investment and local employment.


Works are currently ongoing to demolish the former Ambulance Station and to enhance the Fire Station to accommodate the Ambulance Service making the Fire Station a combined Emergency Services Station. Plans are currently being progressed to close Queensferry Library and to relocate the library within Deeside Leisure Centre. The John Summers High School is currently earmarked for closure.

Previous Surveys of Service Provision

Queensferry is a designated District Centre and as such benefits from considerable information from town centre surveys dating from 1986 to the present and covering the Station Road and Asda Complex areas and the more recently developed Queensferry Retail Park (although the latter actually sits within the settlement boundary for Shotton). Over the last 15 years there has been significant change in Queensferry with the arrival of the Retail Park on the former BRS depot site, which now houses operators including Lidl, B&Q, Charlies Discounts, Pets at Home and B&M Bargain. In addition over the last 15 years Asda has almost doubled in size to accommodate a George clothes wear section and a McDonalds restaurant.

Mapping Service Provision

Queensferry benefits from an extensive range of services and facilities; some of the service provision has been mapped for illustrative purposes and is presented overleaf. As the image suggests service provision in Queensferry is excellent, which benefits not just Queensferry but adjoining settlements such as Garden City and Shotton and the nearby settlements including Connah's Quay, Sealand Manor, Pentre, Sandycroft and Mancot.



RHES Y CAE - SETTLEMENT SERVICE AUDIT

Settlement Commentary

Rhes y Cae is a very small rural settlement situated on Halkyn Mountain and is surrounded by common land. It is a compact village and easily definable on a map. Rhes y Cae has few services and facilities. The School closed some years ago and residents are reliant upon services within nearby towns and villages including Mold. The settlement lies within an isolated rural area of Flintshire, which in combination with poor service provision and infrequent bus services makes it difficult to access services without private transport.



A survey of the village revealed that a number of key buildings have been closed or converted in recent years including the Swan Public House, y Cysegr Chapel, and the Lady Augusta Masonic Hall. Residents within the village are likely to be reliant for day to day services in Glan Y Don and in Maes Pennant whilst having to travel to Holywell or Prestatyn for weekly services such as convenience shopping and banking.







Other Comments

Saltney has an extensive area of industrial units, some of which are in alternative uses. For example, there are a number of non-food retail units on the Brymau Estate on River Lane, which diversify the service provision offer. Go Outdoors was also formerly an industrial unit and the land adjacent has planning permission for 3 large retail units (around 4,000 square meters) this has yet to be implemented. Another unit nearby houses Whizz Kids, children's play centre, and is a popular destination and includes a café for patrons.


It is reported that St Mark's Church in Hough Green, Chester serves Flintshire residents despite being located to the east of the County boundary in England.







According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Shotton and Aston post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 4.5- 21.5 mega-bytes per second with most postcodes in Aston at around 5 mbps and postcodes in Shotton at 14mbps. Accordingly it is to be expected that broadband provision in Shotton is good whilst provision in Aston is poor. Broadband provision is important even in urban areas because slow speeds can affect the ability of local businesses to operate and may impact investment in the area and local employment.

According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Trelawnyd post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 2.8-7.0 mega bytes per second with most postcodes having around 4mbps. Accordingly it is to be expected that broadband provision in Trelawnyd is poor and is constrained. This is likely to have a negative effect on the ability of local residents seeking to operate business in the local area and on access online services such as banking, post office services or online shopping. Regular monitoring reveals that the broadband speed is typically half of what is claimed and, at this time, there are no fibre optic connections available.

Other Comments

Paths in the village are dangerously narrow adjacent to, and across from the Crown Public house. Mobile phone coverage (in both villages) for some providers is limited in some sections of the area. Both villages also suffer from an inadequate sewerage system which overflows onto Cwm Road Trelawnyd during times of extreme weather. In practice, anyone living in either village has to have access to a vehicle as the bus services are impractical.



Settlement Commentary

Ysceifiog, is a small compact and easily identified historic village. It lies on a back road just north of the A541 highway between Nannerch and Caerwys and as a result suffers from a degree of rural isolation. The village name translates roughly as "a place where elder trees grow". The village benefits from very few facilities, a church, pub and village hall. Residents would be likely to use nearby villages and Mold (8.7miles), Holywell (5miles) or Denbigh to access everyday facilities and services. The frequency and timings of a limited bus service also mean that it is likely that residents will be using a private car.

Broadband Provision


According to the latest OFCOM data (2013) Ysceifiog post codes (where data is available) have a median average broadband range of 0.9-1.2 megabytes per second.
